## Greenhouse On Town Road Presents Problem

The Perinton Town Board has under consideration a compromise solution to the problem of the greenhouse which apparently has stood for 30 years in the road-bed of Hulbert Ave., a town road south of the village.

Town officials made it clear that the 32 by 200-foot greenhouse containing roses, eventually will have to be taken down. They suggested a schedule of demolition. About two-thirds of the structure or 25 by 200 feet, rests in the roadbed.

A compromise proposal by Richard C. Hart, owner of Hart Greenhouses, is to remove a strip eight feet wide and 200 feet long from the greenhouse on the Hulbert Ave. side.

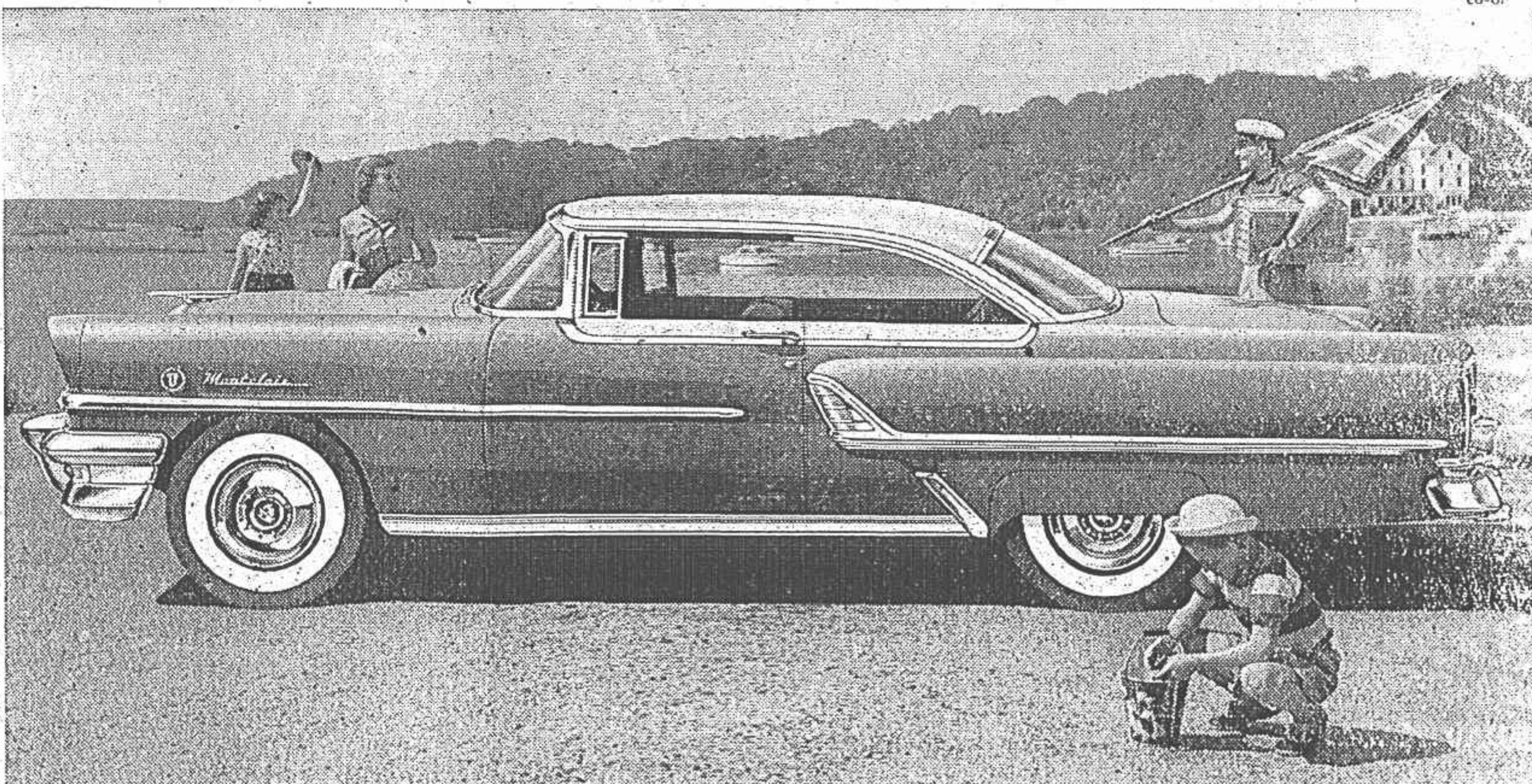
